NOTICE.

The inhabitants of the town of Clarendon who are legal voters in town meeting, are hereby notified and warned to meet at the Town Hall, in the western part of said town, on the FIRST TUESDAY IN MARCH, A. D. 1877, at 10 o'clock A. M., for the following purposes, viz. :

- 1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2d. To choose all necessary town officers.
- 3d. To see if the town will vote to raise a tax upon the grand list to pay its indebtedness.
- 4th. To cast their votes for County Commissioner for the ensuing year.
- 5th. To see if the town will purchase land to enlarge the burying ground at the East part of the town, and to take such action to carry out this measure as they shall think best.
- 6th. To see what action the town will take with regard to adopting the town system of schools.
- 7th. To see if the town will vote to hold Town Meetings hereafter in Town Hall on South Flats, instead of holding them on West Mountain as heretofore.
