Daniel Ewing moved to Chippenhook from Pittsford in the early 1800's. He conducted a silkworm farm in those early years, raising not only silkworms, but the mulberry trees on which they fed. Starting in 1826 with a wooden structure, Ewing and his son had a stone mill constructed in 1830 which stands to this day, although it has long since been abandoned. Russell Fiske of Ira, a stonemason and ancestor of Russell Powers, was the builder, and it was used to manufacture teasels for the carding and fulling of wool. These barbed, pineapple-shaped structures came from the flowerlike portion of the dried teasel plant and were used to store wool in.

A grist and cider mill was operated at the Hook by John F. Keyes from around 1865 to 1920. This was in the large stone building that remains standing near the cement bridge over the Clarendon River.

1976 CLARENDON SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Major areas of discussion and action during 1976 included coordination of flood repairs and ways to encourage industrial and commercial developments. Paul Shedd, the town flood coordinator, worked with the state office of civil defense, in compiling estimates of damage for the 1976 floods. Our road crew did an outstanding job in making road repairs after the summer flood and our road foreman, Carl Lanfear deserves to be roundly complimented.

Mr. Newhall of the Vermont Development Department spoke at a scheduled meeting of the planning commission which selectmen attended. At the suggestion of Mr. Newhall and the planning commission, two articles were placed on the warning for the November ballot; one for the repeal of inventory tax, and one for tax stabilization. Even though the article on tax stabilization was defeated, the selectmen believe this would be a good incentive to encourage new commercial and industrial development. Sensible orderly development is needed to broaden the tax base of the town while incurring a minimum need for additional services.

The selectmen appointed a committee of volunteers to study the question of renovating the Clarendon Flats Town Hall to be suitable for use as town offices (this study requested by the affirmative vote of Article 18B, March 1976 warning). The committee was very active. Following is the committees report:

TOWN HALL STUDY COMMITTEE

Several meetings were held and ideas exchanged. After meeting with several local contractors and touring the building, it was decided that a structural engineer should be hired to determine advisability of renovating the building. The Board of Selectmen approved this action. Mr. Carroll W. Lawes, Consulting Engineer, found the building to have an above average structural system. With this information, we proceeded to get costs from contractors for the renovation. Members are Barry Bradley, George Holden, Leland Congdon, Ruth West, and Doris Weeks.

Whatever the outcome of article 20 regarding town offices, one fact is evident. The town is in need of permanent office quarters and record retention facilities. Because of this, the selectmen have included a provision for a \$5000 sinking fund to be set aside for eventual construction or acquisition.

Revenue sharing is now scheduled to continue. A new form of federal fund recycling termed ANTI-RECESSION FUNDS totaling about \$5000 will be coming to the town in 1977. The distribution of these funds to the towns is determined by using a formula, one factor of which is the unemployment rate in the town.

We are pleased to report an operating surplus of \$10,398 for fiscal 1976. However, the financial condition of the town is not as rosy as the surplus might indicate, and

delinquent taxes are still due in the amount of \$95,039 as of December 31, 1976. Because of these delinquent taxes, the town treasurer has to borrow \$95,000 to \$100,000 on a continuing basis. We have 1976 delinquent taxes in the amount of \$50,417 as of December 31, 1976. THE NON-PAYMENT OF PROPERTY TAXES IS THE LARGEST SINGLE FACTOR AFFECTING THE FINANCIAL CONDITION OF THE TOWN.

It is the opinion of the board that continued improvement and successes will come to the town through the continued efforts, cooperation and hard work of the planning commission, various town boards, and our Town Clerk and Treasurer. We solicit your interest and attendance at regular scheduled selectmen's meetings which take place the second and fourth Monday of the month.

The delinquent tax warrant issued to the Tax Collector as of March 22, 1976, when I took office, amounted to \$66,789.47. As of December 31, 1976, \$24,856.28 has been collected on the delinquent taxes. The warrant for 1976 taxes, issued to me on, October 10, 1976, totaled \$69,569.99. As of December 31, 1976 \$22,897.41 has been collected.

I would like to take this opportunity to remind the taxpayers regarding Real Estate and Personal Property taxes, that if taxes are not paid on the due date, October 5, of each year, the tax becomes delinquent. Once delinquent a fee of 1% per month is added on as a town penalty, a warrant fee of \$.05 cents per name is added on and an 8% collector's fee, for time and expenses for collecting such taxes, by Vermont law. (The Tax Collector does not receive a salary, nor any funds for expenses from the town.)

With regard to Poll Taxes, the same penalties apply. The Vermont law states that if one does not pay this tax his driver's license will be revoked. During this year, I have had to resort to this drastic action.

During the course of the year the Board of Tax Abatement meets to consider requests for tax relief and to hear possible errors. Special application forms are available at the Town Clerk's office. These applications should be completed and left with the Town Clerk who will notify you of the hearing date.

The Tax Collector's office is now located in the Town Clerk's Building. Office hours are posted there, in the hope that this location will prove more convenient, for all concerned.

This, my first year as Tax Collector, has proven to be very interesting. It has come to my attention that many residents and taxpayers do not understand the procedure involved in collecting taxes. I hope the above simple explanation will help in that regard. I feel that this Tax Collector's office has been put "in order" and that I have made headway in getting these past due delinquent taxes collected.

CEMETERY COMMISSION REPORT

As it has been our bicentennial year, there has been a great deal of interest in our old cemeteries. Many out of state people have come to visit and find the burial places of relatives.

Some of the local people and students have made lists of the number of graves and the information on them. We now have these lists on file at the town clerk's office. We are trying to compile these lists for the Vermont Old Cemetery Association of which Clarendon is a member. We wish to thank the following people for their efforts.

Winona Gilman prepared the list for the Marsh Cemetary in 1970. There are 73 graves with the first burial in 1803 and the last in 1943. This year Winona again did a survey of the following two cemeteries. The Smith-Pratt (Button) Cemetery: Eighty-six graves with the first burial in 1777 and the last one in 1976.

The Spafford Cemetery listed 114 graves with the first burial in 1833 and the last in 1975.

Priscilla Metalious took her class from the Union School to the Clarendon Flats Cemetery. Their list totaled one hundred thirty-seven readable stones with the first burial in 1792 and the last in 1958. The students also propped up some of the fallen stones.

A Memorial Day Service was held at the Chippenhook Cemetery by the Judge

Harrington Monument. William Hart of Castleton, State Bicentennial Committeeman, presented the Clarendon Bicentennial flag to Elsa Potter, Chairman of our local Bicentennial Committee. Rev. David Johnson of the Clarendon Flats Church led the prayer. The Clarendon Boy Scout Troop, Albert Sorrell, Scoutmaster and the Clarendon Cub Scouts, Glen Mack, Scoutmaster, participated in the ceremony. The Boy Scouts raised the flag and taps were played by Lee Perry, a member of the Mill River Union School Band.

An Army memorial stone was placed in the Stewart family plot at the East Clarendon Cemetery for the Revolutionary soldier Elias Stewart. Mr. Stewart and his wife are believed to be buried on sand knoll at Haven Hill.

The Spafford, Marsh, Smith-Pratt and Chippenhook Cemeteries were all mowed on a regular basis. The Flats Cemetery was mowed early in the season but due to the poison ivy problem, it was rather neglected in the summer. We were able to do work there this fall. James Gratton replaced the vault door as the old one was beyond repair. He was able to use some of the old hardware and put a nice finish on the wood. We had hoped to remove the large dead pine tree in the center of the cemetery but the cost was prohibitive this year as our budget did not have the necessary funds. This is recommended as a must for the coming year as it may cause more stone damage. A number of branches have already fallen due to our winter winds.

We hope to start earlier next year on all the cemeteries and perhaps manage to kill out the poison ivy in both the Flats and Smith-Pratt Cemeteries.

RUTLAND AREA VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION, INC. ANNUAL REPORT

As the Director of the Rutland Area Visiting Nurse Association, Inc., it is my pleasure to present our Annual Report for the year 1976.

The home health care demand continues to grow and we are striving to provide the best possible quality and quantity of care to the people in your area. Our program still includes Skilled Nursing, Physical Therapy, Speech Therapy, Occupational Therapy and Homemaker Home Health Aide Service. We provide preventive health clinics to Senior Citizens and supply nursing staff to Well Child Conference Clinics. We now have a home dialysis nurse to provide service in the home and we also do contract school nursing.

The Agency continues to work with all agencies in the county to coordinate and try to bring the best possible continuity of care to all people in need. We work closely with the hospital and extended care facilities for better discharge planning. We provide pre-natal classes for expectant parents with follow-up care in the home for the new born and mother if there is a need.

Total direct services into the home that have been provided in your area are as follows:

Skilled Nursing Visits	465
Physical Therapy Visits	180
Speech Therapy Visits	2
Occupational Therapy Visits	5
Homemaker-Home Health Aide Visits	248

We are a certified Home Health Agency, meeting all federal requirements under the Medicare Program.

We do many evaluation visits in the home for physicians to determine patients needs and report back, possibly preventing hospitalization. This continues to be a very worthwhile part of our program even though it is not a chargeable visit.

I would like to express our appreciation for the interest and the support given by your town for the past years and also for the future. We are always happy to provide all the health services that we can. If your town has special needs and requests, let us hear from you.

We are looking forward to continued growth in the coming year.

STATE OF THE REGION

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE RUTLAND REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION

The format of the following report is changed from previous years. Rather than presenting a listing of RRPC activities it was felt that it would be more useful to give a **State of the Region Report** outlining the problems and opportunities facing residents of the Rutland Region. The overall picture painted by the report is somewhat gloomy however, history indicates, and we would like to believe, that a cooperative effort among all communities is the key to improving that picture. On the one hand no one enjoys reading about problems; on the other hand, the following report offers a challenge to all of us in the coming year.

THE ECONOMY—Unemployment in Rutland County has risen dramatically in the last five years. In January 1970 the rate was 3.4% and in December 1976 it was over 8.5% with about 2000 persons collecting benefits. The actual rate of unemployment is far above 8.5% when unemployed workers not eligible for benefits are counted. Personal income in Vermont is relatively low. Vermont's personal income is the second lowest in New England and 11th lowest in the U.S. This is serious noting the high cost of living. Based on job offerings and wages in recent months, wages are not expected to increase significantly over the near future. It was estimated that an annual income of \$7000 was required to support a family of four (not owning a home) during 1975. At least 21% of the families in this region fell below this income figure. By 1977 a family of four will need an annual income of \$8050 and it is estimated that over 25% of the region's families will fall below this figure. The cost of living is increasing much more rapidly than family

incomes, resulting in lower purchasing power and a lower standard of living for the region's residents.

The recent formation of the Economic Development Council of Southwest Vermont—an effort of the RRPC, private industry, local and state officials and the federal government—is a strong indication that people from all over the region can work together to solve a common problem. The long term goal of the council is to improve wages, employment opportunities and family incomes. We now have an organization to deal with the lack of basic sewer and water services and the lack of industrial sites—two problems which have hampered regional development efforts to date.

HOUSING—With only one exception, every community in the region has a need for acceptable housing that exceeds the current supply. Presently, there is a large number of households for which no housing is available at a reasonable cost forcing families to live in unsafe and unhealthy conditions or forcing them to pay more for housing than they can really afford. It has been estimated that over 1,000 households pay an excessive amount of income for purchase of a home and many pay more than 25% of their income for rent. The elderly are particularly hard hit by rising housing costs with many paying 50% of their incomes for shelter. It has been estimated that there will be over 350 new elderly households by 1980. By 1980 the region will need 2,800 new housing units to keep pace with population trends and the need for better housing. It is reasonable to expect that over 500 of these units will have to be publicly subsidized for the elderly, handicapped, and low-income families to live in healthy conditions.

Recent efforts by some communities to provide better housing for their residents is encouraging.

PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION—The lack of public transportation poses some serious problems for low-income families, the young and the elderly particularly when one notes it is these groups which have a real need for personal services not usually located near their homes. The rural character of the region, its dispersed population and the concentration of services in the Rutland City area pose a significant transportation problem for many individuals. The region's new bus system is a big step in the right direction however, it has a limited service area and a questionable financial future. With a larger portion of our population falling into the elderly category and fuel prices likely to increase, public transportation will become increasingly important.

FINANCING LOCAL GOVERNMENT—The ability of taxpayers to pay for increasing government costs is questionable and local governments are not starting or participating in new programs...some are cutting back in critical areas. With the prospect of raising local taxes not much of a prospect at all, many local officials are stabilizing town budgets. Expenditures, now being postponed, are going to come back in the future with much higher price tags. The "belt tightening" efforts of some communities have led them to look for ways to budget and plan for future expenditures. The RRPC is helping several communities do this and it does result in cost savings. However, it appears that the real question facing us is "do we accept less for our tax dollars or agree to pay more for the same level of service"?

nutland mental health service, inc.

On Town Meeting Day in 1976, the residents of Clarendon did not approve an appropriation for Rutland Mental Health Service to help support services provided to your townspeople of all ages and incomes. This year, Rutland Mental Health Service is requesting an allocation of \$1,153 from your town. This request is based upon the population of your town and will help defray the rising cost of services. While this amount is higher than last year's request, we hope you can make an appropriation that approaches this request.

Last year, town appropriations helped support a variety of programs and services. Outpatient counseling, Day Hospital services, Big Brother/Big Sister and the Retired Senior Volunteer program have operated at capacity. The Youth and Family Activities, 24-Hour Emergency Service, alcohol education (CRASH) programs, and the consultations to schools, social agencies and physicians filled important needs.

Services to the developmentally disabled (the retarded, cerebral palsied, epileptic and others) expanded through the opening of a work-oriented Opportunity Center. The Vermont Department of Special Education began to support our pre-school program financially. A Community Education program, directed toward the everyday mental health concerns of the community, was also developed.

The Planning Commission is a group of six people, appointed by the Selectmen, for terms of one to four years, serving without salary. We are businessmen, tradesmen, housewives—all residents in Clarendon, residing in different areas of the town, hopefully to reflect the views of our neighbors, in considering our town's future. The Commission meets at the Town Offices the first and third Monday of every month. This is an open meeting and we encourage anyone interested to attend and participate.

According to State Statutes the purpose of such Planning Commission is to undertake studies and make recommendations on matters of land development, transportation, economic and social development, urban beautification and design improvements and historic and scenic preservation. T.24 #4325. We would like to plan for an orderly and balanced growth of our town; to maintain the Vermont character while creating a balanced tax base.

During this past year a great deal of work has been involved with the Zoning Ordinance. Our Zoning Ordinance is a base and, as we grow, changes will have to be made through public hearings and a vote by the community. Public participation is fundamental to establishing community attitudes. You may obtain your copy of the Zoning Ordinance at the Town Clerk's Office.

In conjunction with this Planning Commission the town has as Administrative Officer whose job is to process building permits and issue Certificates of Compliance. Until November, 1976, Kenneth Wilbur was our Administrative Officer. Robert Chartrand was appointed to succeed him. The Administrative Officer may not issue a Zoning permit unless an application, fee, plot plan and any other approvals required by our regulations have been properly submitted. The Administrative Officer is paid for his time and expenses. Since March, 1976, we have processed 14 permits for new homes; 9 permits for mobile homes; 18 permits for auxiliary and storage buildings; 5 permits for garages; 3 permits for commercial buildings; 4 miscellaneous permits; a total of 53 permits.

Time has also been spent on preliminary work in the industrial development area. We have had discussions with Carl Spangler of the Rutland Regional Planning Commission and Fred Newhall, Industrial Site Consultant from the State of Vermont. As part of these discussions and recommendations we proposed a Tax Stabilization Clause and the repeal of the Inventory Tax. The Commission members and the Selectmen actively participated in local meetings to inform the voters of the importance of these two issues. The Inventory Tax was repealed but

the Tax Stabilization, in its proposed form, which requires a two-thirds majority, was not passed. Both of these items were a first step toward attracting industry to Clarendon, as we are presently considering sites for industrial uses.

Our town is growing rapidly and we believe this growth will continue. We want you to feel, as we do, that there should be some continuity to this growth. We ask for your assistance, participation and support for the future of the Town of Clarendon.

III SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The educational program being offered in Clarendon continues to be one of the finest in the area and much credit for this must go to Principal Thomas Lewis and his concerned and dedicated staff. They are continually working to improve the instructional program. This spring Clarendon teachers will be working with those from Shrewsbury, Wallingford and Mill River to develop and coordinate programs in Mathematics and Social Studies. This is part of our plans to coordinate the instructional programs of all schools feeding into Mill River Union.

The enrollment in the Elementary School seems to have leveled off, thus stabilizing the number of faculty members. The budget for next fiscal year totals \$306,711.00 for an increase of about 5.3%. Most of this increase must be attributed to inflationary factors which are affecting all of us. However, because of an anticipated increase in state aid the amount to be raised by taxes will be \$50,554.00 for a decrease of about 2.5%.

This year's school warning again contains articles on a kindergarten. The administration and school board urge you to approve these items as they will

improve our school program by helping slower youngsters to get a better start in school.

The increased cost the first year will be more than offset by increased state aid the second year and each year thereafter. This increased state aid will result from the increase in number of students, which under the Miller formula will give Clarendon a larger cut of the funds appropriated by the state. It will amount to approximately \$20,000 in additional funds, more than enough to pay for the cost of the kindergarten.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of 24 V.S.A. Section 707B whereby the Town will start Special Town Meetings at 7:30 P.M. on the day preceding that on which the polls are to be opened for voting by ballot. (Australian Ballot)

Article 22. Shall the Selectmen be authorized to enter into contracts, for periods not to exceed five years, on new or additions to agricultural property, for the purpose of fixing the amount in money which shall be paid as an annual tax upon such real and personal property pursuant to the provisions of 24 V.S.A. 2741. (Australian Ballot)

Article 23. Shall the Selectmen be authorized to enter into contracts, for periods not to exceed five years, on new or additions to commercial or industrial property, for the purpose of fixing the amount in money which shall be paid as an annual tax upon such real and personal property pursuant to the provisions of 24 V.S.A. 2741. (Australian Ballot)

Article 24. Will the town vote to assess poll taxes as a single tax, as provided by V.S.A. Title 32, Section 5013-5019 to be payable on July 1 of each year. (Australian Ballot)

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to exclude construction and operation of commercial nuclear reactors, or any other nuclear facility, and the transportation, storage or disposal of radioactive waste from such reactors in the land, air or water of the Town of Clarendon. (Australian Ballot)

Article 26. To transact any other business lawful to be done at said meeting.
